Setting	St. Petersburg, Missouri, a fictitious town on the shores of the Mississippi River, sometime between 1835-1845. During Huck's childhood. During the era of Southern slavery.
Characters	 Huck – 13 or 14 year-old wild and uncivilized boy with an acute moral conscience. He is high-spirited, lazy, clever, loyal, uneducated, but full of common sense. A Noble Savage of sorts. Jim – a negro slave in the South during the time of slavery. Slave of the Widow Douglas. He is mild-mannered, loyal, noble-hearted, selfless, trusting, superstitious and oppressed. Widow Douglas – philanthropic, Christian guardian of Huck Miss Watson – the Widow Douglas's tough old spinster sister Tom Sawyer – plucky and adventurous friend of Huck Pap Finn – Huck's abusive drunkard father Mrs. Judith Loftus – the kind and perceptive poor woman in the shack on the riverbank The Grangerfords and Shepherdsons – like the feuding Hatfields and McCoys of lore and legend The Duke and the Dauphin – scoundrels and thieves who take up with Huck and Jim Joanna, Mary Jane, and Susan – three sisters the Duke and Dauphin try to scam
